



No. 117/69-70). BMSSS is a secular, non-governmental, not-for-profit organization for the uplift of the marginalized Women, Children, Youth, Farmers, the Sick and the Suffering. The organization works especially for the development of Dalits and Minorities. BMSSS is registered under 12A and 80G under income tax department. It is also registered with NITI AYOG and Ministry of Home Affairs of the Government of India.



DEVELOPMENT APPROACH

With the support of Catholic Relief Services (CRS) of the United States of America (USA), Food distribution program was one of the major charitable activities of BMSSS in the first two decades of its existence. The program covered all the remote and undeveloped areas of the Archdiocese of Bangalore.

BMSSS started functioning with charitable activities. The approach of the organization shifted from charity to integrated development with a priority for women empowerment. From the year 2005 onwards, BMSSS began to focus on networking with other NGOs and partnering with donors in implementing various development programs with emphasis on Rights Based Approach (RBA) in all programs and activities.

Women Empowerment

'Women development' program supported by Misereor, Germany through KROSS, Bangalore aimed at the development of women by organizing them into taluk and district level federations of Self Help Groups (SHGs) in villages of Mulbagal and Srinivasapurataluks of Kolar district. The women were trained during the program to affirm their rights by availing their entitlements in the field of health, education, income generation and political participation.

KOLPING INDIA has been working for many years with BMSSS to develop the capacity of women in the Archdiocese of Bangalore by forming Self Help Groups (SHGs). They are working in 58 villages in Bangalore Urban, Bangalore Rural, Kolar and Tumkur districts in Karnataka. Today 1345 members exist in 92 Self Help Groups (SHGs) in 5 districts of the Archdiocese of Bangalore with a total saving amount of Rs.79,97,020/-(Rupees Seventy nine lakh ninety seven thousand twenty only).

Entrepreneurship Training For Women

The Entrepreneurship Training for Women supported by Manos Unidas, Spain aimed at forming SHGs of women, developing their capacity through trainings and enlightening them to start their own business to generate income. The formation of women in the targeted areas of KGF has helped many women to come out as responsible women in the society. Through regular visits to various localities in KGF and constant motivation convinced the women to become leaders in the challenging society. The leadership of women helped in creative thinking for a sustainable life. The formation of women into SHGs brought unity among women and made them think together to achieve their goal of empowerment and entrepreneurship.

Objective: Improve the living conditions of 375 women in KGF through training and awareness which then allow them to have their own business to generate income




HIV/AIDS Education and Awareness

The project "HIV AIDS Education and awareness among School and College students" summarizes the project activities undertaken during the project period. During this period, awareness on HIV/AIDS was created in the targeted government schools, government colleges, SHG members, voluntary members, parents, and teachers in five talukas of Kolar District in Karnataka state. With support and network of likeminded organizations and voluntary members, BMSSS was able to reach out to various categories of people affected by HIV/AIDS. The students and the community at large were made to analyse the discrimination and stigma faced by the HIV/AIDS infected people.

The project activities involved presentation, role plays, activities, quiz competitions, essay competitions, street plays, Talks from resource persons, and World AIDS Day observance. These strategies yielded good outcome. BMSSS thank the Schools and college management for the permission and the support received from voluntary organizations in carrying out these activities.

Target Achieved in 2 Years







Results Achieved in 2 Years

- > During the project period 21062 students gained knowledge on the causes and symptoms of HIV/AIDS.
- > 150 Children from 22 schools came forward and formed HIV club to spread awareness to the public through rallies and classroom sessions.
- More than 3000 students, teachers and SHG members participated in the world AIDS Day program organized at 3 different places. (KGF 2016, Bangarpet 2017, and Bethamangala 2018)
- > 30 Schools and 3 colleges have made it compulsory in observing World AIDS as an important activity.
- > 60 Resource persons were involved in giving special talks and counseling sessions to women and parents.
- > 150 villages are covered in spreading awareness in terms of conducting activities like school visit, SHG visit, and Family visit and organized street plays.
- > 3 Staffs of BMSSS are actively involved in giving resource talk in educational institutions and health centers. They are paid with honorarium.
- > 27 Schools have initiated medical camp and HIV Check up.
- > 12 colleges are networking with us in organizing Seminars related to HIV issues and Public Awareness.
- > 10 likeminded organizations are closely collaborating with us in preparing new modules and new strategies to implement programs in schools and colleges.



Agriculture in rented Farm land

Neelamma- a member of Sarveshwara Self Help Group (SHG) of Bettadaulsoor village in Kanakapura taluk of Ramnagar district attended BMSSS training on Government Schemes. The aim of the training was to apprise the SHG members about availability of subsidized loan from agricultural department of Government of Karnataka and the ways to access them for improving their agricultural practices to earn more income.

The training improved Neelamma's knowledge on various Government schemes and how she can easily access them. Neelamma realized that growing silk worms was a profitable business in her village. She also knew that mulberry trees do not take much time to grow and it can be easily cut down at any time for other agricultural works. However, she was in a dilemma of accessing Government loan as her family had no agricultural land of her own to plant mulberry trees for growing silk worms. She was advised by the trainer and the animator to lease a land from someone in the village as planting mulberry trees for growing silk



worms. Neelamma took a subsidised loan from the government and paid Rs. 20, 000/- towards lease amount for a potato farm in her village on lease. She began to cultivate Mulberry plants on potato farm with the purpose of silk worm growing. She is now able to pay monthly rent for the land besides earning substantial money from her agricultural labour.

Dare to Drive

PRABHA joined St. Anthony's SHG (Self Help Group) of women in KGF and started saving Rs.100/- monthly. Her savings of Rs.3600/- is deposited in the bank account of her SHG.

She got married 14 years ago and has a son studying in 8th class. Her husband was the breadwinner for the family. After her husband's death, she was much troubled without knowing how to meet her financial needs. As she realized that she had to earn for the livelihood of her family, find means for her son's studies, and to live in society as a woman with dignity, she started to learn driving a four wheeler and got a driving license.

As the next step, she took a bank loan, bought a used van and became a driver herself. Her first decision was to reach school children with her vehicle. During the day, she uses the vehicle for reaching patients to the hospital and taking women to Government offices. As the days passed, her van needed repairs for which she was unable to gather sufficient funds. She applied for a loan from her SHG and got Rs.10000/- for repairs of her vehicle.

With the unrepaired vehicle, she was offering service to children of two schools only. After repairing the vehicle, she was able to pick & drop school children from 4 schools. She began to earn good income too. The cost of fuel for the vehicle is about Rs.12000/- and monthly expenses for vehicle repairs is about Rs.6000/-. The balance amount is used for the school fees and family maintenance. The entrepreneurship development training she got from BMSSS helped improve her business and livelihood. She also shared her dream of buying another vehicle to earn more income and become an employer.


